Homeless trafficker jailed

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A HOMELESS man who took his eight-yearold son on a \$10 million drug run through the Mallee will spend almost seven years in jail before being eligible for parole.

Thirty-eight-year-old Yaqoob Hassanpoor pleaded guilty in Wentworth Local Court in December last year to supply a large quantity of a commercial drug after Dareton Police found him in possession of 20 kilograms of the drug ice.

Hassanpoor's young son was seated next to him when he was intercepted by police, who found the drugs in the tray under a canopy as well as under the driver's seat.

The man told police he had obtained the drugs while in Sydney and was transporting them to Adelaide and his son had simply wanted to go on the trip.

Hassanpoor was travelling through Balranald in June last year when police carried out a licence check and noticed the accused to be visibly shaking, nervous and sweating.

Almost 8kg of methamphetamine was found in a green shopping bag under the ute's canopy, while another another bag containing 5.9kg of the drug was also

After being arrested by the Dareton Crime Investigation Unit, Hassanpoor told officers there was another 5kg bag of ice in

A further search revealed the bag plus two resealable bags containing ice under the driver's seat labelled "Kingpin" and "Zombie Killer", each containing about 100g of ice, along with \$680 cash and a set of scales.

Hassanpoor appeared at the Downing Court in Sydney last week when he was sentenced to nine years and three months in jail, with a non-parole period of six years and nine months subject to supervision.

He has been in custody since his arrest
